MEETING CALLED TO ORDER

Deputy Supervisor Farrell called the meeting to order at 7:00 p.m.

Deputy Supervisor Farrell led all in attendance in a Pledge to the Flag

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SUPERVISOR'S PROCLAMATIONS & REPORTS

Deputy Supervisor Farrell gave his report OF NOTE:

Supervisor Puglisi on vacation.

Town Paving is underway. The Town will be paving about 8 to 8.5 miles of the Town's 106 miles of roadway; a little more than usual. The project is about 50 percent complete. The project is being performed by ELQ Industries under the supervision and direction of Michael Preziosi, Dir. DOTS. The project should be completed mid September.

Congratulated Peekskill on the award of a 10 million dollar grant for economic development . Gov. Cuomo visited the City of Peekskill to award this grant. This will allow them to complete and elevate various projects. However, what is good for Peekskill is good for Cortlandt. The Town of Cortlandt entirely surrounds the City of Peekskill.

Economic Development report received by Tom Waitkins, Town Assessor. Some of the tax receipts that the Town of Cortlandt receives from Cortlandt Crossing, which is the development across from Cortlandt Town Center. The general Town receives over \$15,000 a year in taxes from that project. The Highway Dept. receives over \$90,000 from this project. A well received commercial project that showcases the importance of economic development.

The Town Board agenda tonight includes a road and parking arrangement for the Friends of Old Croton Aqueduct. They will be doing some volunteer work on the aqueduct trail, 9/28/19. Please feel free to join them in maintaining the trail by cleaning away invasive plants, and planting native species.

The Cortlandt Community Rowing Association is pleased to announce that Sam Kemp was our first rowing coach, and really helped the club get on its' feet. His sister Rosa Kemp made the USA National Rowing Team, and has a great chance to go to the Olympics.

Town Clerk, Laroue Rose Shatzkin is expecting her first baby, and the Town Board would like to congratulate her, and will miss her presence while she is on maternity leave.

ROLL CALL

On a roll call attendance taken by Town Clerk Shatzkin, all Town Board members indicated their presence except for Supervisor Puglisi who was absent.

Councilmember James Creighton gave his report OF NOTE:

Congratulated City of Peekskill on the award of the 10 million dollar grant from Governor Cuomo, and hoping the Town of Cortlandt will be next in line to receive a grant. Governor Cuomo has been in Peekskill several times within the last year, and has yet to come to Cortlandt since the announcement of the closing of Indian Point, which he finds a bit irritating. We are hoping he will come through on some long term economic development initiatives for the Town of Cortlandt real soon.

<u>Councilmember Debbie Costello gave her report</u> OF NOTE:

A reminder to everybody that on Sunday, 9/8/19 the Croton Arboretum is celebrating their 25th Anniversary at the Black Cow in Croton from 5:30 p.m. to 7:30 p.m.

Congratulated Laroue Shatzkin on her pregnancy, and wished her a happy, healthy delivery.

<u>Councilmember Richard Becker gave his report</u> OF NOTE:

He reiterated and supported comments from Councilmember Creighton regarding Governor Cuomo's visit to the City of Peekskill, and how he seemingly ignores our community since he was the one to make the decision to close Indian Point.

Charles Cook Pool has been very enjoyable this summer. It is a very well run, clean facility. He is very impressed by the lifeguards. The new mini golf course is beautiful, and a lot of fun. The tennis courts, and the nature hiking trail are extremely nice features in our Town.

The CHOP program is entering its' 10th year in the Town, and is on the agenda tonight for reapproval. It is a one time fee of \$5 for any residents of the Town of Cortlandt, and offers a significant discount of oil.

Congratulated and wished well to Laroue Shatzkin, Town Clerk.

APPROVAL OF THE MINUTES

Councilmember Costello made a motion to approve the Minutes from the July 16, 2019 Regular Town Board Meeting seconded by Councilmember Creighton with all voting AYE.

The Public Hearing was opened at 7:20 p.m.

Michael Preziosi, Dir. DOTS stated that the Cortlandt Blvd. East Sewer District is the current development known as Pondview Commons, and will allow for the connection of approximately 56 apartment dwellings to be connected to the Town's distribution system. It is an extension, which will create a new district.

Tom Wood, Town Attorney added this is a trilogy, and the Town Board over the last two years has created the West Dist., Central Dist. And now the East Dist. So this solving some issues that existed in the Fawn Ridge Dist., which is Westbrook Drive area, and it now opens up greater capacity along the Rte. 6 corridor.

Councilmember Creighton made a motion to adjourn the public hearing, seconded by Councilmember Becker with all voting **AYE**.

The public hearing was adjourned at 7:22 p.m.

- 2. Public Hearing to consider the formation of the Pondview Drainage District.

The Public Hearing was opened at 7:23 p.m.

Michael Preziosi, Dir. DOTS stated that this is a part of Pondview Commons as well. The drainage district will encompass the entire site, and will incorporated provisions in order to maintain these storm water contention basins and infrastructure being created on site. It will be maintained privately to begin, but allows the Town in the event that it is not maintained to have a taxable ability on that property.

Councilmember Becker made a motion to adjourn the public hearing, seconded by Councilmember Costello with all voting **AYE**.

The Pubic Hearing was adjourned at 7:25 p.m.

Michael Preziosi, Dir. DOTS stated that this drainage district consists of the Cortlandt Town Center, and all the wetlands and intentions basins behind this construction. The extension will incorporate the Cortlandt Crossing Development into this district.

Councilmember Costello made a motion to close the Public Hearing, Adopt the Negative Declaration, and Adopt Resolution seconded by Councilmember Creighton with all voting **AYE**.

The Public Hearing was closed at 7:26 p.m.

Tom Wood, Town Attorney stated this proposed Local Law would require any motels operating within the Town of Cortlandt to obtain an operating permit. Based on the application and notification to the Town they would be required to maintain a higher level of maintenance to the property. It would open the building up to more frequent inspections by the Town. It would prohibit anything except for transient rentals, which are defined in this law. So there would no long term stays.

Councilmember James Creighton made a motion to close the Public Hearing, Adopt the Negative Declaration, and Adopt Resolution, seconded by Councilmember Becker with all voting **AYE**.

The public hearing was closed at 7:29 p.m.

He thanked the Town for the paving of Sassi Dr. He also wanted to commend the people particularly lifeguards at the Charles Cook Pool, and thinks they do a really nice job. He further commented on Aviator Park, and how dogs do not belong on picnic tables, and asked that signs be put up. He then asked if Westminster Dr. could be paved.
